Braided Rivers seminar 2021

Thank you once again for your assistance in helping to sponsor this event.

Some 210 people were booked to attend. Cancellations and re-bookings ended with 190 people confirmed, and 184 attending on the day. We opted to cater for 180 people based on past years' late cancellations and no-shows. This worked out well as 3 people were unable to stay after the morning presentations and others arrived after lunch.
