



Tarāpuka black-billed gulls



We are the smallest and rarest gull on Earth. We only live in New Zealand, endemic like the kiwi. We arrive in Spring to breed in colonies on clean shingle braided river beds. After our chicks leave the nest, we all fly north along the coast and to the North Island. We are critically endangered because our population has declined more than 80% in 30 years. Many of our eggs do not hatch or chicks grow up because of predators, weed-filled rivers, and big floods.
