






Records of Colonies and wrybill 2016 Bealey Bridge to Mt. White Bridge




Records of Colonies and Wrybill 2016 Gooseberry Stream to Esk River




Comparison of Counts of Threatened Species Upper Waimakariri 1981 - 2016

Conclusions

- Upper Waimakariri has wide diversity of species and significant numbers of threatened species
- The river probably meets the requirements of the status of an Outstanding habitat in terms of numbers of threatened species, endemism of those species and diversity of guilds
- It is a particularly important river for the "endangered" black-fronted tern and the nationally vulnerable wrybill

Recommendations

- Black-backed gulls are present in numbers that are a threat to nesting of other birds but in numbers where control is achievable.
- Shrub weeds, especially Russel lupin, are widespread in the Bealey to Mt. White section of the river. Control targeted at the tributary fans is recommended.
- The river's location has considerable potential for improving awareness of the values of braided rivers as educational facilities are nearby and it is bordered by both State Highway and railway leading to an important recreational and tourist attraction at Arthurs Pass.
- There is a need to put together the results of all the recent river surveys in order to re-assess populations of the threatened species and their trends.

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
