#### **General Information**

A copy of the draft programme is attached. You will see that the course includes both mist-netting and cannon-netting. On these days you will be catching and banding birds for research purposes. This 'bird-in-the-hand' experience is for most participants the highlight of the course. There may be an opportunity to try your hand at extracting birds from the mist nets, but this cannot be guaranteed.

Please note that both topics and tutors may still be changed. The order of events may also change before the course starts, and then according to the situation on the day – weather, birds, people, etc.

The course fee of \$1120 includes all accommodation and meals.

The Pūkorokoro Shorebird Centre has a large lounge/dining area with kitchen at one end, and a display area with a small gift shop at the other. There is a fully equipped lecture room.

Sleeping accommodation for course participants is normally in four or six-bed bunkrooms\* with mattresses and pillows provided, and shower and toilet facilities adjacent. Bring pillowcase, sleeping bag or blankets and sheets, towels, and toilet gear. Bedding can be hired from the centre if you need to travel light.

For the field work sessions, the following are useful: binoculars, bird books and hand lens. You may not already have all these items, but do not rush out and buy them. Some may be borrowed, or in the case of field guides, purchased from the centre, and during the course you will learn the qualities desirable for future purchases. A telescope and tripod can be provided for the use of each participant, but you may wish to bring your own scope if you have one. Wet and cold weather gear and sunhat and sunblock are essential items.

We rely on participants sharing transport for field work.

A caterer provides all meals. Please advise us in advance if you have any food requirements.

Course participants help with washing and clearing up. Tea and coffee making facilities are available at all times. Please bring a contribution of goodies like fruitcake or biscuits, home baking or bought, to share for teas and suppers. If you like a beer or a glass of wine or soft drink, etc. with your dinner, bring that too.

The centre relies on tank water, so please bring plenty of clothing for the week to avoid having to wash any. Old shorts, shirts and trousers will be ideal for outdoor work - be prepared to get dirty at

times. You may get wet or muddy at least three times. It is essential to bring tight-fitting beach shoes or old trainers or similar that tie on for walking in mud and water. Gumboots could be useful for walking in long grass if the weather is wet (but are not suitable on the mudflats.)

The nearest shops are a small grocery store and petrol station at Kaiaua, about seven kilometres north of the centre.

If you have been involved in an interesting bird or conservation project, there will be an opportunity to speak about it briefly to the group (maximum 5-10 minutes) so do bring any relevant display material, slides, short power point, etc. If you want to show a sequence of photos, please have these edited and named so that they sort appropriately and in a separate folder before you arrive. If you wish to show a ppt, short video or photos, please have them on a memory stick in a file with your name on it

## **Equipment List**

- Sleeping bag or sheets and blankets
- Pillow slip
- Towels and toilet gear
- Ear plugs useful if you are a light sleeper.
- Old clothing for field work
- Casual clothing otherwise
- Soft-soled shoes for indoors
- Walking shoes or boots (gumboots can be useful if wet)
- Old trainers/surf boots, etc (tie-on/zipped is best as the mud is sticky) for walking **in** the mudflats essential for at least two sessions.
- Warm jacket, hat
- Waterproof jacket (over-trousers too if you have them)
- Sit-mat or small old cushion may be useful for sitting waiting on shell banks.
- Sunhat
- Sunblock
- Sunglasses (glare on shell bank can be intense)
- First aid requirements/medication
- Insect repellent
- Torch essential for the night activity as well as occasional use around the centre
- Small day pack
- Drink bottle
- Thermos may be enjoyable, not essential.

## Please bring the following if you have them:

- Binoculars
- Camera and the connections to download digital files to the centre computer.
- Field guides
- Telescope and tripod: Note we can supply each participant with a scope and tripod if needed.
- Hand lens
- Slides, display material, etc on a stick, if you have a topic you want to tell the group about on the evening of Day 2.
